"British Citizenship"


As part of an effort to crack down on terrorist activity within Britain, Prime Minister Tony Blair has instituted a new series of tests that all applicants for British citizenship must pass:

- ☐ The ability to praise the Americans while dearly indicating that they got lucky that one time in the late 1700s.


And finally ...

The Chaplain writes

The Freedom of Lent...?

David Adam begins his Lent book, Passing the Test, with a remarkable statement: 'Lent is not a time for restricting yourself but for throwing off restrictions and realizing new liberties.' I don't know about you, or whether you are even in the habit of observing Lent in the traditional way, but I was brought up thinking of Lent as a 40-day period to give up some vice or some unhealthy food. Lenten fasting was all about self-denial. Denving chocolate or (when I was older) alcohol or (another thing I've tried recently) giving up TV. All of these things are negative, though. What Adam is suggesting, rather, is that Lent should help us to realize our potential, our fullness, our freedom, in Christ. True, that may mean re-examining some of our bad habits and putting them on hold for Lent, or if needed, laying them aside altogether. But that is not the central thing. More importantly, Lent is a time of pointing us to our Lord and recognizing the freedom of the people we should be. Lent, means 'lengthening', as in the lengthening of days in early springtime. Shouldn't Lent therefore also be about the extending of our own understanding of God's purpose for us, too?

Perhaps part of God's purpose for you is to join in serving Him as a member of our Church Council? This is a vital (and despite what you might think, not too time-consuming) ministry that is crucial to the direction of our church. This year's Annual General Meeting is after the service on March 19th, at Jacobi Family Hall, Oude Needseweg, 18, Markelo, behind Weldam Castle. (Oude Needseweg is off the Haaksbergerweg, near where Haaksbergerweg intersects with Rondweg [the N346] on the south side of the easternmost canal bridge from Goor.) At the AGM, there need be elections for four regular places on the Church Council, as well as for the two posts of Churchwarden. Some current Council Members now ending their 3year terms are willing to stand again, but they must, in any case, be re-elected, as must the Churchwardens, who are elected each and every year. Treasurer Colin Lee and Churchwarden Marykay Schouten, after years of excellent and faithful service, have both



We are beginning a new pilgrimage toward greater health, and we will need energy and imagination and God's guidance to be the loving family in Christ that God wants us to be. May Lent be a stretching time for all of us, that we may strike out beyond whatever holds us back and stretch our spiritual horizons for the future. May we
