The Chaplain writes

Ways of Seeking what God wants for us

All who took part in our Away Day back in the early spring will recall that the top priority we identified for our chaplaincy was the need to seek God's will for a church's life. Prayer and fellowship were recognized as vital to this aim. We noted in particular the need to build up our prayer life in small groups (which can meet conveniently during the week where people live). Some of the good ways we identified for us to seek God's will draw on the example of the Early Church. Acts 2:42: 'They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of the bread (both in the Eucharist and in family meals) and the prayers.' The first Christians met in their homes and in the temple to share with each other and to seek God's will. And so God led them in the Spirit, and they grew, in spiritual maturity and in number. What a fantastically inspiring model of church life and one that so very much differs from the sometimes disconnected and isolating way we live in modern society.

We can all rejoice and be encouraged by signs in our chaplaincy that we are trying to move closer to the Early Church's inspiring model. I am particularly delighted to witness burgeoning interest in groups and activities devoted to prayer, Bible study and spiritual growth:

Home Group Bible studies meet regularly in Apeldoorn and Winterswijk, and a new group is forming in Goor. If you'd like more details, ask the Chaplain or speak to Mariska Olaniyi (0546 451 556).

A Christian Basics course for adults is starting up in November. It will address the core questions about our faith, and is ideally suited for anyone interested in either being confirmed or received into the Anglican Church, or anyone else in need of a basic refresher on our core beliefs. The first two meetings will be on 12 November and 26 November, after church (12:30 –14:00 – bring a sandwich!). If you are interested, contact the Chaplain.

There is an Anglican Netherlands Area Council seminar in Utrecht on Saturday 28 October on 'Christian healing ministry within the life of the local Church', led by Revd Russ Parker of the Acorn Christian Foundation. Exercise For Seniors

ST LUKE'S DAY 18TH OCTOBER

4th October - St. Francis of Assisi



St Francis (1181 - 1226) is surely one of the most attractive and best-loved of all the saints. But he began by being anything but a saint. Born the son of a wealthy cloth-merchant of Assisi. Francis' youth was spent in fast-living, parties and on fast horses as a leader of the young society of the town. Then he went to the war between Assisi and Perugia, and was taken prisoner for a vear.


By the time of his release, Francis had changed. Perhaps his own suffering had awakened him to that of others. In any case, he abandoned warfare and carousing, and began to help the poor and the lepers of his area. Then one day a voice which seemed to come from the crucifix in the small, semiderelict church of Damiano Assisi 'Go and repair my house, which you see is falling down'.

This religious experience was a vital turning point in Francis' life: Jesus Christ became very real and immediate to him. His first action was to begin repairing the church, having sold some of his father's cloth to pay for materials. His father was not amused, in fact he was furious - until Francis renounced his inheritance and even his clothes by his dramatic stripping off in the public square of the town. The Bishop of Assisi provided him with simple garments, and Francis began his new life.

His inspiration was always religious, not social, and the object of his quest was always the Crucified Christ, not Lady Poverty for her own sake. Francis rebuilt San Samiano, and then travelled as a pilgrim. His compassion for the poor and lepers became famous. Soon disciples joined him, and they set up a communal life in simple wattle and daub huts. They went on occasional preaching tours. (Not until later did they become an Order whose theologians won fame in the Universities.)

In 1219 Francis visited the Holy Land, and his illusions about the Crusaders were shattered. He went on to seek out the Sultan, and tried to convert him. Back home, he found his Order was now

1. The oil of the sick.

In the letter to St. James (ch5v!4) we read: "Is any among you sick? Let him call for the elders (priests) of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name

of the Lord, and the Lord will raise him up." The rite of anointing the sick in mind or body, those about to undergo surgery, those nearing death, with the oil of the sick is now readily available in the Church.

This kind of anointing is itself a Sacrament and so whether physical or spiritual strength is sought, the sufferer can be confident that God will provide it in response to the prayer of faith. Requests for this Sacrament should be made to a priest, and are increasingly welcome.

2. The oil of catechumens



A 'catechumen' is somebody who is preparing to become a Christian, and so this oil is used to accompany the Rite of Baptism. Although its use is not enforced in the A.S.B., it is both allowed and is being encouraged.

When used, anointing at Baptism is a symbol which points to the gift of the Holy Spirit, which comes to the newly baptised person as it did upon Christ at His Baptism in the Jordan. In Baptism we are "born of water and the Spirit" (John 3:5), the Holy Spirit which is the gift of Christ to His Church.

This anointing also reminds us that at Baptism we are made part of the Royal Priesthood of the Church. (Our Kings and Queens are anointed at their coronation, as are many priests at their Ordination.)

3. The Holy Chrism

Holy Chrism is the oil used to anoint people at their Confirmation, and which is used to anoint priests at their Ordination. It is also used in the consecration of altars and Church buildings. 'Consecration' means making

holy or setting apart for God's purposes. It differs from the other two oils in that it alone is not pure olive oil. A scented balsam is mixed with the oil to make the Chrism.

Anointing with Oil

Oil as a Symbol

We are all familiar with oil, in one form or another, in all aspects of our daily lives. We use

it for cooking, heating, lubricating, and in a thousand and one other ways. Without it there would be no industry, no transport, and we would have to do without many of the 'plastic' goods we take for granted.

Oil has always been the 'life-blood' of society, a fact which the Jewish people of the Old Testament were very aware of. The oil which the Jews knew, and which is still in use today, is olive oil and it is the same oil which we use in Church. For the Jews a plentiful supply of oil, along with corn and wine, was a sign of God's favour. Oil was, and still is, a sign of God's blessing because it represents all that is best in life, God's generosity to the people He loves.

Oil in Church

We use oil in Church in two ways: we burn it in votive lamps, and we anoint people with it. In both cases its use can be traced back to the earliest times, and is recorded in the Old Testament and the New. The Christian Church adopted the use of oil from both Jewish and pagan practice very early in its history.

Although anointing with oil largely fell from favour in the Church of England for several hundred years, its importance has been rediscovered. It has been restored to its proper place in the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation in the Alternative Service Book (A.S.B.). Its use in the Sacrament of Unction, or Anointing of the sick and in the Ordination of Priests, is increasingly widespread.

The Three Oils

The oils used for anointing are specially blessed for this purpose by the Bishop at the Chrism Mass on Maundy Thursday, so called because one of the oils used is called 'Chrism'. There are three oils used in Church, all olive oil but named for the purpose for which they will be used. They are 1. the oil of the sick, 2. the oil of catechumens, and 3. the holy Chrism.

5,000 strong, and growing. Francis stepped down as head, but continued to preach and was immensely popular. He died after a prolonged illness at 45, and was canonised in 1228.

Francis' close rapport with the animal creation was well known. The story of his preaching to the birds has always been a favourite scene from his life. He also tamed the wolf of Gubbio. This affinity emphasises his consideration for, and sense of identity with, all elements of the physical universe, as seen in his Canticle of the Sun. This makes him an apt patron of nature conservation.

The 20th century witnessed a widespread revival of interest in Francis. Sadly, some films and books caricatured him as only a sentimental nature-lover or a hippie drop out from society. This ignores the real sternness of his character, and his all-pervasive love of God and identification with Christ's sufferings, which alone make sense of his life. Two ancient, and many modern English churches are dedicated to him.
