## Edgar Albert Guest

1881 - 1959

Edgar Guest, known as Eddy to friends and family, was born in Birmingham, England. In 1891 he emigrated with his family to the United States of America. In 1902 he naturalized as an American citizen.

Edgar began his working career as a copy boy with the *Detroit Free Press* and then a reporter. His first poem appeared in 1898. He continued to work with the Free Press for the next 60 years. With their consent his 'poem a day' went into syndication, appearing in 250 newspapers.

His output, of a poem a day in print for over thirty years, reached a wide audience. There was a wide appreciation for the folksy sentimental verse by the man who regarded himself as a newspaper man first and the a poet. In 1952 he was made Michigan's Poet Laureate, the only person to be given that title.


# Be a Friend

# The Chaplain writes

# **Healing Ministry**

A few short sentences at the end of one of the lesser-known epistles (James) say

much: '5: <sup>13</sup>Are any among you suffering? They should pray... <sup>14</sup>Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. <sup>15</sup>The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven. <sup>16</sup>Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective.'

Many of us in the chaplaincies have been interested in the question of healing, and in particular how we might begin to develop our ministry of healing here in the Anglican Churches in the East Netherlands. Those of us who attended two seminars in Utrecht these last years came away with new insight and inspiration on healing and our collective calling to get involved with it. In particular, the words of the Revd Dr Russ Parker in late 2006 remain with me: 'The church gets involved with healing because the Lord commissions us to it.'

We are all familiar with the many miracle stories of Jesus healing people throughout the Gospels. Most of his miracles were healings. But on numerous occasions, Jesus tells his disciples to heal others. See Luke 9, paralleled in Matthew and Mark: "Then Jesus called the twelve together and gave them power and authority over all demons and to cure diseases, 2 and he sent them out to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal.' And later, when the mission was growing even more, Jesus '10: 16 appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go,' saying, among other things, '8Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, ... 2 cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The kingdom of God has come near to you."

Jesus' ministry was devoted to healing, not just in the physical sense, of course, but also in the spiritual, psychological and social senses (forgiveness and reconciliation), as well as in the ultimate sense of healing the rift between us and God. Jesus' ministry shows us that God rates healing as one of his highest priorities, one in which we share as His Church.

It is important not to have too restricted a definition of healing. The Old Testament and New are full of varied, illustrative examples of how healing works, so we should be wary of our own tendency to confine God's healing work to our own experiences or understandings. In the Bible, healing appears to be:

Often a journey, not just an event

Often a walk in newness of life

Often relational – involving individuals, also those around them and even the environment Usually inclusive of pastoral and spiritual as well as medical resources (e.g. note the advised use of oils in James 5)

# **Summary of the Council Meeting 20** May 2008

#### ICS connection

An item of discussion at the AGM was the link between the Intercontinental Church Society (ICS) and the Twente Chaplaincy. The question debated was, 'should Twente keep the link with the ICS?' Following the discussion,

the vote taken on keeping the link delivered a clear

majority. However, if the link also included patronage, the majority decreased. The council agreed to discuss this issue at the 20 May meeting.

At the council meeting, a point raised during the discussion was that it was important to uphold the independency of Twente. In that sense, the word patronage is not the correct term to use, but rather the terms 'underwriting' and 'nomination rights' to cover what the ICS link involves. In return for linkage, the ICS will underwrite the chaplain's stipend if a major financial crisis should occur in the chaplaincy. The ICS link also gives the society nomination rights. That is, they have a representative on the interview panel selecting a new chaplain.

The chaplaincy council does however prepare a chaplaincy profile. This document details, as an example, the area in which the chaplain would work, the make-up of the congregation, or congregations, and the type of person sought. The purpose of the profile is to give prospective candidates an idea of the chaplaincy apply for the post.







Usually involving the risk of faith in God More serious, in many ways, than life and death (healing and wholeness being, in some sense, bigger than mortality itself)

Because the call for the church to be involved in healing is so central and because so many in our chaplaincies have expressed a desire for us to enlarge our ministry of healing (beyond the praying and pastoral visiting we already do), I felt that now is the time to offer a form of a healing ministry during worship, on occasion. So we shall offer it on 29 June.

In keeping with St James' advice, this ministry will involve the entire church that Sunday, and not just the clergy. But the level of involvement will be entirely voluntary, except that all of us will be encouraged to pray. How I propose it work: Those who wish to receive the ministry of laying on of hands for healing – whether for themselves, or on behalf of another person who cannot be present – will, after the distribution of communion, be invited to come forward to the chancel area. Others will be invited to come up to support them, at least one attending each person receiving the ministry. Everyone else will be asked to pray where they are. Those receiving the ministry will not be asked what it is that needs healing. Our main function in the service is to facilitate God's own work of healing for them. But, should those receiving the ministry desire to pray with someone further about whatever there need might be, a prayer ministry will be available after the service.

This form of healing ministry in worship is but a partial witness to the healing that our church can be involved in, and it is by no means a substitute for the prayer and visiting that many are engaged in. But it is a small and faithful approach that has been adopted in other Anglican churches and which I thought right to adapt to our use to enhance our healing ministry. If it is well-received (as it has been elsewhere) then we can continue to offer it at other services in the year (perhaps quarterly, or as requested).

God works healing in all sorts of wondrous ways, sometimes subtly and quietly, sometimes spectacularly, but it is always best to leave to Him how He chooses to heal. A basic prayer for healing is 'May Jesus Christ bring his healing to your (or my) need, now.' This is a prayer that leaves the nature of healing to the Lord, but nonetheless expresses a faithful expectation that the Lord does heal in some way. James says, 'l6bPray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective.' It is my hope we will pray for each other, and that through this ministry, we may experience even more of God's healing and wholeness.
