The Chaplain Writes

I am enjoying my new environment. The walks through the woods are now accompanied by sun and green leaves coming out in abundance. The season will become even more abundant – though while I am writing this, the temperatures is almost tropical and I have no desire for that to become even more abundant. And yet, we don't have a choice in this, but the abundance is right for this time when we celebrate Pentecost.

By the time you read this, we will have just celebrated Pentecost. It is the feast which is sometimes marked as the birthday of the Church – Church with a capital C, to remind us of the wider Church. Not just the Anglicans, or the Baptists, or the Protestants, but all believers together. Not the institution, but a group of people who together worship the one God.

In the first letter to the Corinthians, chapter 12, we find the gifts of the Spirit, and, if you have doubts about the Helper sent to us and whether his help is for real, look around. Gifts which we cannot acquire by dutiful study but which are given to us for free. Wisdom, faith, healing, speaking in tongues, discernment of the spirits and so on. And with these gifts we have to build God's Church and his Kingdom – here and now in the world we inhabit and not when we get to heaven, because then we will have missed the point. We are called to build God's Kingdom now!

Looking at the world around us, we may get discouraged. The world is far from peaceful and agreement between people may sometimes seem far off, but maybe we need to look a little closer at the people we meet every day rather than at the events in the newspaper! To see the people who are responsible for feeding the homeless, who visit prisoners, who look after the elderly or who just try to reach an agreement without harsh words. People who





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Catching Oysters



A story is told of about John Wesley and one of the early Methodist lay preachers, a man with little formal education. On one occasion, the lay preacher took as his text Luke 19:21, "*Lord, I feared thee, because thou art an austere man.*"

Not knowing the word *austere*, the simple lay preacher thought that the text spoke of "an oyster man". So he spoke about the work of those who retrieve oysters from the seabed. He described in detail how the diver must plunge down from the surface, cut off from his natural environment, into cold water. He gropes in the dark, cutting his hands on the sharp edges of the shells. When he has the oyster, he kicks his way back up to the surface, up to the warmth and light and air, clutching in his torn and bleeding hands the object of his search.

So Christ, declared the lay preacher, descended from the glory of heaven into the squalor of earth, and sinful human society. His purpose was to retrieve humans, and bring them back up with him to the glory of heaven. His torn and bleeding hands were a sign of the value he has placed on the object of His quest.

Twelve men were converted to faith in Christ that evening. Afterwards, someone complained to Wesley about the inappropriateness of allowing preachers who were too ignorant to know the meaning of the texts they were preaching on. Wesley simply said, "Never mind, the Lord got a dozen oysters tonight."

Appointment of Next Archbishop of Canterbury

Announcements in the *Church Times*, *Church of England Newspaper* and *The Times* began the consultation process ahead of consideration by the Crown Nominations Commission as to who will follow Dr Rowan Williams as the 105th Archbishop of Canterbury. This is the first time the process for nominating a new Archbishop of Canterbury has begun with such an announcement, following changes to introduce more transparency in the appointment of bishops.

The Most Revd and Rt Hon Dr Rowan Williams will be stepping down from the office of the Archbishop of Canterbury on 31st December 2012.

The Grace, made public on Commonwealth Day, gives thanks for the Queen's life of service to the nation and Commonwealth, and invites God's blessing on the food communities and on all those taking part in local Big Jubilee Lunches.

The Grace will be prayed by millions of people throughout the Commonwealth on Sunday, June 3rd, before they share a Big Jubilee Lunch in their communities. It can be used in part or in its entirety. By including words of blessing "on the people beside us", it doesn't assume that everyone will say the prayer, which is said in Jesus' name.

As one church leader said: "Millions of people in the 54 Commonwealth states will be celebrating the Diamond Jubilee and sharing food together to mark this special occasion. Together we thank God for the Queen and for the good things God gives us. Saying the Diamond Jubilee Grace together before we eat acknowledges that God is our loving provider."

The grace reads:

O God, the author of peace and lover of concord, we give you thanks for the Diamond Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth; for her steadfast faith and for her royal service to this nation and all the peoples of the Commonwealth.

Bless the food before us and the people beside us; may the sharing of this meal strengthen our communities, and nurture the bonds between us of friendship, hope and trust.

We ask this in the name of Jesus Christ who reigns as servant of all.


My dear Nephew Darren,



Need Something to Read?

... Then see me and borrow a book featured on World Book Night.

On 23rd April 2012, World Book Night was celebrated in the UK, Ireland, Germany and the USA. In the UK they celebrated their second-ever WBN and 20,000 readers gave away copies of their favourite book from the 25 chosen titles. They gave them mostly to strangers – usually whom they met on the street – to encourage those who may not normally read to share in the love of reading.

In the UK, each book was registered with BookCrossing.com and given a special registration number. I am a member of BookCrossing, and through the kindness of fellow members, who were also chosen as "Givers" for 2012, I have been able to get hold of some of the 2012 WBN editions, which I would like to share with others in our church community.



I am hoping to get all the 25 titles chosen for 2012, but it is very difficult for me to get these. So at the moment I only have six of the 25 chosen titles available for anyone to borrow. All I ask is that you return the book to me after reading it and tell me what you think of it, so that I can add your book review to the BookCrossing history of the book you have read. You are, of course, very welcome to go to the BookCrossing site yourself, enter the special BCID number (which is written inside each book), and write the review yourself. You may do it anonymously if you wish. If you do not want to do that, then I can enter the review for you in your own words – as few or as many words as you like. It can just be "I liked the book" or "I didn't like this book", if that is all you want to say!! You may, of course, take your time
