The Chaplain Writes

'Peace be with you'

With these words, Jesus came into the room where the disciples huddled

together, waiting for the next things to happen. They had no idea that the Helper, who would come to their aid, would enable them to speak boldly, without hesitation and without fear to be persecuted. They were free!

We do receive that very same peace during the Eucharist, beginning with the words: 'the Lord be with you' and followed by: 'we meet in the name of Christ and we share his peace. The peace of the Lord be with you'.

It is not a personal wish of the celebrant! He or she acts only as a mediator to bring the peace of the Lord to each one of you in the congregation. You wouldn't expect the Communion to come from the celebrant and you realize that the bread broken and shared comes from God. And so it is with the Peace. It is His gift to the people, who want to accept it, and the priest is only the mediator.

This month we celebrate Pentecost, the beginning of the Church. A group of people who didn't choose each other, but are put together to make community. A community of love, where we have to bear each other's shortcomings and enjoy each other's gifts. Where we want to create a place of warmth and love, where mutterings can be overcome and where we have to apply the words of John in his letter (1 John 5.14-15):

'And this is the boldness we have in him, that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us. And if we know that he hears us in whatever we ask, we know that we have obtained the requests made of him'.

Do pray these words with all your heart!

Caroline, who has attended St Mary's Chapel for many years and has served as Warden and Treasurer as well as being involved in numerous other church activities, proposed a motion for the magazine to switch to a fully digital online version only. Caroline argued that at a time when the chaplaincy finances are running with a deficit, the cost of a printed magazine was a luxury the chaplaincy could not afford. Although the motion was not carried, Caroline made a valid point.

The magazine will only be secure if everyone collecting a printed copy pays €15 p.a., and those receiving a copy by post, pay an additional €20 annually. Anybody interested in seeing what the digital version looks like can look on the church website. At present, fifteen people use this method.


On dealing with summer fetes

Prayer Chain

Two years ago, I tried to start a prayer chain but there were not enough people wanting to join. We need at least 12 people to make it work. Yet there are people in our congregation who worry about illnesses, other unpleasant situations in the family, as well as events such as exams and travels. All can be brought to God's attention. The more we pray, the more God will listen to us.

The concept is rather simple. The leader receives a prayer request by telephone or email. He, or she, then either phones, or emails, others in the chain. They in turn call another person, according to a list, and if that person does not answer, they then call the next person on the list. The requester should always give both name and the reason for the prayer in as few words as possible.

Members of the prayer chain will pray once or twice every day for the people on the list with requests. They do so at a time that is convenient for them. The prayer does not need to be complicated. Naming the person is enough since the Lord knows them and their problems already.

Names will stay on the list until the requester phones, or emails, and asks to be removed from the list. Members of the prayer chain will receive regular updates of the confidential list. Nobody outside the chain, other than Alja, who will always be informed about the prayer requests, needs to know about any requests. Requests for prayers can also be made to through Alja. If necessary, it is possible to give only the name of the person to be prayed for. Nobody but the leader will know about the reason for the request.

Some people do not want to be prayed for in the church service. For them the prayer chain offers another possibility to be supported in prayer. Members of the congregation of St. Mary, their family members and nearest friends can make requests for any matter that concerns them. We need at least twelve people willing to pray to start the chain. Because of practical reasons, we will start at the beginning of September with the prayers.

He ain't here!

For six years, I lived in Tennessee, and I loved to read the messages posted on the signs outside of churches. I made a small hobby out of watching these church signs and commenting on them in my mind. Sometimes they were wonderful; sometimes not so wonderful.

An example of a wonderful one was: "Honk if you love Jesus. Text if you want to meet him." An example of ones that were less than wonderful was: "If you think it's hot outside now, imagine Hell."

One time during Easter, I saw a sign that said: "He ain't here." I thought, "What! Am I missing something?" I thought that Jesus' resurrection meant that he was here. But then I realized that this sign made the most profound and powerful statement about Easter I've ever read.

The statement goes with the grain of the resurrection account depicted in the Gospel of Mark that we read at the Easter Vigil: "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised: he is not here."

With these words, Mark conveyed a very profound point: Jesus is no longer among the dead. All of us are bound to this world and all of us will die. Jesus is not here. Jesus is with the living now. His body has been raised, he has ascended, and he is seated at the right hand of God. He is not here, and that is good news, because he has risen.

He is not here, but he is present. Because the power of that resurrection for us means we have new life in Christ. The power of that resurrection for us is that now we meet Christ in each other, and we meet Christ in our friends and strangers. We meet Christ when we look in the mirror. We see ourselves beloved of God, chosen by God, part of God's body, which means we are joined to Christ through grace.

To be a Christian is to take part in a kind of embodied community, meeting Christ in the body of Christ on the altar, meeting Christ in the mystical body of Christ that is the church. And that's good news because when Christ is present, life is present. When Christ is present, salvation is present. When Christ is present, healing is present. So he ain't here. But he is present. Let us bless the Lord.

Where are you?

Over the past few months' people have asked me if there is anything wrong with me, since I no longer regularly attend the church services. Instead of telling the same story repeatedly, I have decided to inform you collectively in this article.

I can assure you that there is nothing wrong with me. But I have accepted a position as choir director in Delden. In the chapel of the St Elizabeth Care- and Nursing homes there are services every Sunday at which the choir sings most times. There are 25 choir members, mainly women, and it has a mixed Catholic, Protestant, background. The choir has already been in existence for 30 years. Last year they were desperately looking for a new director. I hesitated, for I am at an age where you do not easily start new things. But after consulting with Alja, I decided to give the job a go, with one condition, twice a month I would be able to attend my own church, St Mary's Chapel.

Well, it has turned out to be a real joy. With a team of several Protestant and Catholic pastors and a handful of organists, every service is both a surprise party and a challenge for me. The choir has a very broad repertoire of about 500 songs, with new ones are added to the list monthly. In addition to all that, they also sing Gregorian masses and canticles.

Preferring to celebrate the high feasts, such as Christmas and Easter, in our church as I do was no problem. For most of the services in the St Elizabeth are in the afternoon, dependent on the specialities of the nursing homes.

During the services in the 'Driekoningenkapel', the official name of the St Elizabeth homes' chapel, I often feel God's presence through little deeds and actions. Christmas is especially most moving with demented people. Just as God can be visible in children, He is also visible in very old people. I hope to be able to carry on with this work for a

long time as I so enjoy it.

Caroline Chisholm - helping girls in India and emigrants to Australia

If you want an example of someone who can show you their faith through their works, Caroline Chisholm is a saint for you. This doughty little 19th century English woman had such a compassionate heart that she



helped tens of thousands of people, from India to Australia.

Caroline was born in Northamptonshire in May, 1808. Her father William was a pig dealer, and already had 15 children, by four wives. When Caroline was about five, her father brought a poor maimed soldier into the family home, and urged his children to look after the wretched man well, as he had fought for their freedom. This disinterested compassion for poor struggling 'outsiders' would become the lodestar of Caroline's life.

When Caroline was 22 in 1830 she married Captain Archibald Chisholm, of the East India Company Army. Out in Madras, Caroline grew alarmed for the young girls growing up in the barracks. She founded the Female School of Industry for the Daughters of European Soldiers, to provide a practical education.

After having two sons, and working on the Indian subcontinent for a number of years, Captain Chisholm was granted a two-year furlough in 1838 on grounds of ill health. The family moved to the sunshine of Australia, near Sydney. Here Caroline was appalled at the conditions that faced emigrants, especially female, arriving in the colony. Many ended up working the streets, just to survive. Caroline stayed for seven years in Australia, placing more than 11,000 people in homes and jobs, and in all, her Female Immigrant Home helped more than 40,000 people. Highly respected by the government, she gave

PENTECOST PENTECOST

Justin Welby, our present Archbishop of Canterbury, two months before Pentecost, issued an encouragement to all churches to dedicate the week leading up to Pentecost to prayer. Continuous prayer, a prayer chain or a 24/7 prayer week are some ideas. This idea connects to the 120 followers of Jesus, who, following the Ascension of Jesus, remained together for ten days in the Upper Room, waiting for the promised Holy Spirit.

Amazingly, halfway through these two months of preparation in prayer for Pentecost, the public heard the news that Justin Welby had learnt that his father was not his biological father. He was in fact, illegitimate. On being asked what he thought about this, Justin Welby was 100% clear. Nothing had changed for him because his true identity was in Christ, a strong message for all Christians to be aware of. That we have, through the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, our own eternal identity in Christ.

We are through the Spirit born into God's house and are his beloved children. What was amazing too, was to see how Justin Welby managed the attacks on him to undermine his spiritual authority. We should pray for protection over each other and especially for our church leaders, who are always operating on the front line.

St Paul sums up the message for Pentecost in Galatians 4.6; "Because you are his sons, God sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, the Spirit who calls out, "Abba, Father."

But that is not the end of the story. We need a refill of the Holy Spirit daily to walk in the Spirit and be a channel of Peace and Love.

evidence before Legislative Council Committees, but accepted money from no one. When Archibald left the army in 1845 he and Caroline toured Australia at their own expense, collecting more than 600 statements from emigrants that detailed the truth about the problems of emigration.

Back in England, the statements caught the attention and respect of Charles Dickens, the House of Lords Select Committees, Lord Shaftesbury, Sir Sydney Herbert, Wyndham Harding FRS and even Pope Pius IX. Caroline and Archibald went on to help more than 3000 people *safely* emigrate to Australia, before moving back there themselves, where they both died in 1877. In his novel Bleak House, Charles Dickens is said to have partly based the character of Mrs Jellyby on Caroline Chisholm.



This lovely story has been around for some time, but if your readers have not seen it, it is well worth sharing...especially in the month of Pentecost, when we recall the importance of the unity of the Church...

You and Your Goldfish's Attention Span



How long can you concentrate on any one thing? According to a now infamous study by Microsoft our digital lifestyles have had such a detrimental impact on our concentration levels that our average attention span has fallen to below that of a goldfish. Humans now stay focused for just eight seconds, before being distracted by news alerts, social media and so on – while even a

goldfish can concentrate for nine seconds.

And it is not just the endless stream of information that hits us, but the type of information that is so distracting. Violence and endless conflict can leave you distressed and unsettled. Medical experts recommend regular non-digital breaks such as a walk, a chat, or even just staring out the window.

Meanwhile, try these tips to calm your mind:

- 1. In the evening, reverse the settings on your device, so that you have white writing on a black background. This reduces the blue light that affects your brain's cyclic rhythm, disrupting your sleep/wake cycle.
- 2. Get moving. Exercise takes time, but it also sharpens your mind and increases your concentration. So in the end you will get more done in less time.
- Eat well. Avoid sugar and too much caffeine which make your mind busier.
- 4. Seek company. Anxiety levels rise after six hours, due to the changes in your brain hormones caused by social isolation.
 So if you work from home, take your laptop to a coffee shop for an hour, or see a friend for coffee.
- 5. Fill the final half hour of your day with one simple task, rather than flitting from task to task.



Small plates are better

How large are your dinner plates? If you replace 30 cm plates with 25 cm plates you could end up eating between 16 and 22 per cent less food. That could mean a loss of 13 kg over a year. The study was held at Cambridge University, and concluded: "Helping people to avoid 'over-serving' themselves or others with larger portions of food or drink is likely to help reduce their risk of overeating."

THE LADY & THE LAMP

On 12th May 1820 a baby girl was born who changed the way that we care for people who are ill. Florence Nightingale grew up at a time when only the worst kind of person became a nurse but she had an idea of the way things could be. Her chance to change things came with the Crimean War.

Florence travelled there with a few others and started work in the military hospital at Scutari where conditions were dreadful: wounded soldiers were left lying in dirt without proper food or care and most of them died. The army doctors already there didn't want Miss Nightingale or her nurses, but gradually they improved conditions. The nurses scrubbed and cleaned as well as caring for the wounded and the soldiers began to recover. Florence Nightingale was called the Lady with the Lamp because she would walk the wards at night, checking on patients. After the war, with the support of Queen Victoria, Florence was able improve hospital care for everyone.

Asperger syndrome is a form of autism. People with Asperger syndrome are of average or above average intelligence. They have fewer problems with speech but may still have difficulties with understanding and processing language.

So what is Autism?

Autistic people see, hear and feel the world in a different way from other people. If you are autistic, you are autistic for life - autism is not an 'illness' and cannot be 'cured'. Often people feel being autistic as a fundamental aspect of their identity. You might hear people say that autism is a spectrum condition. This means that, while all autistic people share certain difficulties, being autistic will affect them in different ways. Some autistic people also have learning disabilities and other conditions.
