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

Give to God what belongs to God.

Dear Saints,

The world is in turmoil. Violence is the order of the day. Intensification of the war on our doorstep (Ukraine and Russia). Words like refugees "streaming" into Western Europe, citizens having war fatigue starting to be numbed by the atrocities of the war, wanting to shut ourselves to the consequences of this unbridled violence, not wanting to think of the ensuing winter months, which can only complicate and intensify people's suffering in Ukraine. To make matters worse, the war between Palestine and Israel is taking sub-human proportions of attacks and counter-attacks by Hamas and Israel. Unspeakable human suffering and a polarised world citizenship depend on the side you are on.

Taking sides in a war that dehumanises our neighbours justifies our revenge efforts. We are all onlookers, yet participants. Alliances are formed, yet none facilitate life, only death. There are also wars in other parts of the world, Mali, Nigeria, Ethiopia, Somalia, Armenia and Yemen, to mention just a few. And we are sitting here in the now, feeling powerless, knowing if we do not work toward peace today, the lose-lose situation we find ourselves in will only intensify.

Sunday's gospel reading, 22nd October, Matthew 22:15-22, is a continuation of the plot to accuse Jesus of wrongdoing by the socio-political and religious elite (Pharisees and Herodians), aimed at killing him. Politically, just about the only thing Pharisees and Herodians had in common was their dislike of Jesus. The Pharisees sent their disciples with the Herodians to engage Jesus in such a way that he could be tricked into a death trap.

So they put aside their many differences for a moment and come together to pose Jesus a question that they hope will put him between a wall of fire and a sheer drop: "Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor, or not?" (verse 17)

People also warn me about the damage a vine can do to your house. And then I laugh. Because my house has gotten an extra way of insulation. In the summer, my house is remarkably cool; in the winter, bare branches and evergreen climbers add to the pleasant temperature inside.

There is only one climber I don't want to cover my house: it is the ivy. Where the other plants and the vine leave some black spots from the suction cups on the walls, the ivy squeezes itself between the stones and tries to push them apart. 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

The problem for Jesus, of course, is that the questioners ask a question which they think allows only a yes-or-no answer. Their purpose in doing so is to limit Jesus' options so that he has no choice but to answer in a way that will compromise him. If Jesus answers that the taxes are lawful, he will alienate those who hate the tax and the coin. If he answers that the taxes are not lawful, the Romans will arrest him for sedition. Either way, Jesus loses, and his "enemies "win.

Jesus, who always goes to the heart of the matter, answers the question with another question. His question reframes the issue subtly by asking to see the coin used to pay the tax.

"Show me' the coin used for the tax." And they brought him a denarius. Then he asked them, "Whose image is this and whose title?" They answered, "Caesar's." Then he said to them, "Give therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's."

The biblical understanding of humans, male and female, is that we are God's image bearers. What is the inscription on us? Lover of God and lover of neighbour as we are lovers of ourselves?

So what good news lays within God's words to us in this scripture in our present confusing day, where we live in a world which expects us to choose the side of those from dominant cultures? We do not have to be between a rock and a hard place because our choice is to have relationships and make choices that give God what is God's. All of us are made in God's image! Our choices, therefore, should reflect this.

Our Emperor said: "Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness." We must never forget to render unto God the things that are God's.

Statement from the Church Council of the Anglican Church Twente regarding the resignation of the Churchwardens.

October 2023

- Council deeply regrets the decision by the current wardens to resign as from 1 November.
- We understand that in the past there have been differences in management approach and communication style between the wardens and the chaplain, which have led to the decision to resign.
- Council sincerely appreciates the deep commitment and efforts made by the wardens over the past years. Their contribution to the functioning of our church has been of great importance.
- We wish to ensure the good functioning of St. Mary's, also into the future. To this end an Extra General Meeting will be held on 5 November to elect new wardens.
- Council greatly values the enthusiastic leadership and liturgical guidance provided by the chaplain. We wish to ensure that the chaplain can continue her essential work as priest at St. Mary's.
- In order to ensure that in the future wardens and chaplains can smoothly work together, Council proposes to set up a review mechanism that will allow wardens and chaplains to voice any concerns, in confidence, at an early stage. Those involved from the Council in this mechanism will report to the full Council about their findings, respecting always the confidentiality in which any concerns may have been raised.
- Council recognizes that this is a time for healing, prayer, and a search for reconciliation. It will do its utmost to make this possible.
- Council wishes our church to move forward as a vibrant, inclusive, diverse and inspiring community, where all are welcome.

Conscious living and no waste

We are slowly learning not to waste a lot of things in our daily lives. What kind of things do we waste? What goes in the containers that the municipality collects? To name a few products: textiles, appliances, and, not to forget, food.

About the last, it is necessary to say the following: Every year, about 30 kilos of food per person is still thrown away in the Netherlands (we are not the biggest throwaways in the world). This food all ends up in the green container, so it is not eaten. WHAT CAN WE DO ABOUT IT!

Here are some valuable tips:

*Buy no more food in the supermarket than you need until your next shopping day. Nowadays, you find a refrigerator in most supermarkets, where food that is exactly on the date and discounted is presented. (I discovered that it often can be kept for two more days.) So it is economical and still okay to eat.

* While preparing the meal, remember that you don't cook too much So you are not getting too many leftovers. But if you have leftovers, use them in the following day's meals, such as soup or a salad. Crusts of bread are perfect for making tosti's. And the birds like them too, but be careful not to throw them on the ground because they attract rats, but put them in a birdhouse or on a shelf attached to a single pole.

And, of course, if you have a freezer, lots of food can be stored in them. When my children were little, I used to save the leftovers for three or four days and bake or grill each with other ingredients like fried onions, fried mushrooms or cheese. And they were eating with great pleasure the little heaps on their plate, curious to discover the new taste.

The Netherlands restaurants together throw about 55 million kilo's of good food yearly! Not to imagine! Doggy bags are relatively unknown in the Netherlands.

Do you always empty your plate in a restaurant? If you do, it is a compliment to the restaurant owner and... nothing from your plate will end up in the waste-container. A win-win situation! Contributed by Erica Schotman Bonting

The Poppies of Remembrance

In late 1914, WW1 erupted across Northern France and Flanders. Great swathes of previously green fields and forests were blasted and bombed, leaving them bleak and barren, with seemingly every living thing destroyed.

But then in the Spring of 1915, something beautiful began to come out of all the destruction. Tens of thousands of bright red Flanders poppies began to put out tentative shoots across the endless vistas of mud. These resilient little flowers had actually flourished in the middle of so much chaos and destruction, because their seeds grow when exposed to sunlight, through disturbances to soil.

We all know that these endless fields of cheerful poppies, growing in the midst of such misery and destruction, were what inspired the Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, to write the now famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'.

And it was McCrae's poem which inspired an American academic named Moina Michael to adopt the poppy in memory of those who had fallen in the war. She got it adopted as an official symbol of Remembrance across the United States, and worked with others who were trying to do the same in Canada, Australia, and the UK.

A French woman, Anna Guérin who was in the UK in 1921, caught the same vision, and planned to sell the poppies in London. There she met Earl Haig, the founder of the Royal British Legion, who was persuaded to adopt the poppy as its emblem in the UK.

The Royal British Legion, which had been formed in 1921, ordered nine million poppies and sold them on 11 November that year. Ever since then, the red poppy has been a symbol of Remembrance, of support for the Armed Forces community, and also of hope for a peaceful future.

Founded in 1979, the Anglican Church Twente belongs to the Church of England's Diocese in Europe. The Church of England forms a part of the worldwide Anglican Communion of more than 80 million people

The Anglican Church Twente, based at St Mary's Chapel, Weldam provides a Christian ministry in the East Netherlands. Most of the congregation live in the towns and villages of the East Netherlands and across the border in Germany. Some come from further afield.

The Anglican Church Twente holds a service every Sunday at 10:30 am in English. The church offers Holy Communion to all baptized Christians, Sunday School to nurture and educate children in the Christian faith, and a warm welcome to people of all nationalities.

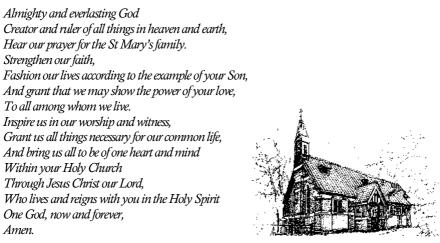
The main aims of the Anglican Church Twente are to:
