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

Dear Saints,

I suppose we are all aware of the very popular sayings, groans or self-talk; when we are stuck or find ourselves robbed of our ability to change situations in complicated and sometimes painful relationships or settings, we would say to ourselves or be advised by family or friends, to "just let go" or "just move on, it is not worth it." Or "forgive, forget and move on". Or "try not to think about it." We are advised that because we cannot it change the past, let us move on as it is what it is; there is nothing we can do about

My present personal favourite; "I am too old for this, ... really, I am too old for this, ... when are we going to learn, ... never!"

Does the above contradict what is expected of us as Christians? A people who are encouraged to stand in the midst of life, a life that has a living past, a vibrant present and a life-giving future. A life full of unexpected twists and turns, a life built on a relationship with a God who is always the same yet ever-changing?

As followers of Christ, we are encouraged to remember to hold on to what is right and true to do good, as that is what God expects from us and has revealed to us in nature through God's love for us in Jesus Christ our Lord and God's love for the world through us loving our neighbours as ourselves.

We are particularly reminded to look at the example of those who are martyred for the sake of and because they refuse to believe that the whole created order does not belong to God and, therefore, that we all have or should have equal access to its benefits. On why the C of E should never combine parishes

The Rectory St James the Least

My dear Nephew Darren

I suppose it had to come, but combining parishes is now firmly on the agenda for our villages.

I had always wondered what



the first Earl of Stowe was trying to prove, building a church here in 1347 to accommodate 800 people when the total population has never exceeded 250. In the short term - which in this village is measured in centuries - it seems to have been to house the tombs of his 13 successors. I now realise it was to make uniting with adjoining parishes in the 21st century more difficult. Clearly the first Earl had formidable foresight. None of our neighbouring churches seem too keen to share their reserves to help maintain our cathedral-sized building.

The threat of the closure of St Herve the Bard has, inevitably, caused outrage – not so much from its regular congregation of three, but from all those in the village who would never think of attending. People do so *like* to have a church not to go to.

The church of St Bregowine, built by a wealthy parishioner in the 19th century because she did not like the high church practices of the parish church of St Iwig, is refusing to re-unite, even though the two churches stand only 100 yards apart, in a village with a diameter of 300 yards. If only they could get over the trauma of seeing the incumbent putting water in the wine on Easter Day in 1894.

(Although it must be conceded that the Bregowinians were equally affronted that when the daughter church opened in 1895, they found that the Iwigers had provided no brass troughs at the end of the pews for umbrellas. That they have subsequently refused to install them has only compounded the offence.)

Meanwhile St Plegmund is in discussions with the Church of South India as a way of avoiding uniting with anyone. Should it happen, I will be interested to see what travelling expenses the new incumbent claims. It will be difficult to tell when the present incumbent resigns, as he has not been seen at a clerical meeting for the last 30 years. Some of my colleagues suspect he is mythical, that a bloodless coup took place in the 1980s and that the church is now entirely run by the Mothers' Union. (Continued from page 6)

The church of St Maximus of Constantinople in our nearest town has rather grandly offered to take all of our churches under its wing, but as a parishioner has pointed out: how could we possibly consider joining with a parish that fought on the other side at the Battle of Bosworth in 1485.

In the meantime, we will serenely carry on, as we seem to have done for the past six centuries; parish mergers and reductions in numbers of clergy seem to be of less interest than debating the suggestion that we change the brand of coffee served after Services.

How to avoid back pain.

When you spend long hours in your car, like going to church on Sunday mornings, but also on a train (a plane would also be a possibility, but church-going is slightly overdone, I would say), it's easy to develop neck cricks or back spasms that can actually interrupt your listening to the sermon and spoil your pleasure in singing the hymns. So whether you are driving or just along for the ride, it's healthiest for your back if you sit at about a 105° angle - leaning slightly backrather than at a straight 90° angle. You should also adjust your seat so your knees are slightly higher than your back and hips if driving. This relieves pressure on your back and hips. If you're a passenger, do the same by either moving your seat or putting your feet up on a small bag.

If your journey, flight, train or bus ride, is longer than an hour, or you tend toward neck pain, roll a blanket or sweater to about the diameter of your clenched fist. Tuck it lengthwise behind your neck while you're seated to maintain the area's natural curve. You can do this in a hotel, too, if the pillows aren't comfortable. There are pillows in the church, but I fear you would disappear from the priest's sight because the pews' backs are too low.

You may have learned to drive with your hands at 10 and 2 (clock positions). However, dropping your hands to the 8 and 4 positions is better for your neck and shoulders. Better yet, use your car's armrests for support if you have them. It is also essential to save your arm muscles, for it is very



awkward if your hymnal slips out of your cramped fingers and drops on the floor with a loud thump. To fetch it up, you have to lay flat on the bench on your stomach to pick it up again.

Another thing is recommended if you are bringing a rolling suitcase. (The sermon may be so long you are falling asleep). Push the suitcase in front of you - like a shopping cart (but with one hand, if you like) - rather than pulling it behind you. This is much gentler on your back, shoulder and arm muscles. When the church door is left open, a cool air stream may be straight into your neck. A cold air draft can tighten muscles and create neck pain later on. Blankets in the church are available, so don't hesitate to ask for one.

On the long car drive home, your back is idle enough that fluids creep into the discs. As fluids enlarge discs, they become more vulnerable to injury. So, if you log many kilometres, don't jump out of the car and immediately hoist your luggage or pick up your grandkids. Instead, take a few minutes to walk or do gentle stretches to reduce the fluid buildup. Simple moves - but your body will thank you for them the week before the next service or vacation. ©Erica Bonting



The remarkable usefulness of Allen keys

All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work. 2 Timothy 3:16-17

We all need practical skills, and they are not always easily gained.

I seem to spend a lot of time assembling flat pack furniture of one type or another. The trick is to look and sound as though you know what you are doing, even though any skills are gained through trial and error. It is surprising how many household projects require an Allen key, which if you have not seen one, is an L shaped rod with a hexagon end which fits into an identical sized recess in the top of a screw. You can use the longer or shorter arm depending on the job needs extra force or speed.

The idea of a hexagon *socket* screw was probably thought of as early as the 1860s to 1890s, but such screws were not widely manufactured until around 1910. In 1909–1910, William G. Allen also patented a method of screw heads which had a *hexagonal* recessed die. The key that he lent his

name to fits nicely into the head of the screw, is cheap and easy to use.

When you are called on to do some DIY, especially after someone has had a go, the best thing is to refer to the instructions and keep all your Allen keys together in one place so you can easily find them. They come in different sizes.

All Saints' Day - the Feast Day of all the Redeemed

All Saints, or All Hallows, is the feast of all the redeemed, known and unknown, who are now in heaven. When the English Reformation took place, the number of saints in the calendar was drastically reduced, resulting in All Saints' Day standing out with a prominence that it had never had before.

This feast day began in the East, perhaps as early as the 5th century, commemorating 'the martyrs of the whole world'. A Northern English 9th-century calendar named All Hallows as a principal feast, and such it has remained. Down the centuries, devotional writers have seen in it the fulfilment of Pentecost and Christ's redemptive sacrifice and resurrection.

The saints do not belong to any religious tradition, and their lives and witness to Christ can be appreciated by all Christians. Richard Baxter, writing in the 17th century, wrote the following:

He wants not friends that hath thy love, And made converse and walk with thee, And with thy saints here and above, With whom forever I must be...

As for my friends, they are not lost; The several vessels of thy fleet, Though parted now, by tempests tost, Shall safely in thy haven meet...

The heavenly hosts, a world without end, Shall be my company above; And thou, my best and surest Friend, Who shall divide me from thy love?*

1,255 ancient English churches were dedicated to All Saints a number only surpassed by those dedicated to the Virgin Mary.

Remembrance Sunday this year falls on 10th November, and Remembrance Day on Monday 11th.

Remembrance – and Gratitude

This year's Remembrance includes several significant dates from past wars.

2024 marks the 110th anniversary of the start of World War I.

2024 marks 80 years since D-Day. The Normandy Landings of 6th June were the largest

seaborne invasion in history. The beginning of the Ällied invasion of Normandy led to France's liberation and laid the foundations of the Allied victory on the Western Front.

2024 marks the 80th anniversary of the Battle of Monte Cassino in Italy, the bloodiest battle of the Italian Campaign, when Allied forces finally broke through the Germans' notorious 'Gustav Line' and freed Route Six and the way to Rome.

2024 marks the 80th anniversary of the battles for Kohima and Imphal, where in northeast India, the Imperial Japanese Army was held off by much smaller numbers of British and Indian troops. In Kohima alone, the defenders held off a staggering 25 Japanese attacks over 14 days in appalling conditions. When Indian troops arrived to relieve the defenders, the Japanese encirclement was broken. Amongst the liberators was Havildar Major Rajindar Singh Dhatt of the Royal Indian Army Service Corps from the Punjab.

2024 also marks the 80th anniversary of Operation Market Garden in the Netherlands, when the Allies managed to free Eindhoven and Nijmegen but famously failed to capture the bridge at Arnhem. (The story is told in the film A Bridge Too Far)

As the British Legion says, "While D-Day was fundamental to the Allied victory, the Second World War was not won on any single day - or battle - and we will recognise and pay tribute to all who served from the British Armed Forces, Commonwealth and allied nations, such as those who served in the Battles of Monte Cassino, Imphal and Kohima, Operation Market Garden and the Scheldt.

This year, the British Legion also looks beyond the Second World War to Kosovo and Afghanistan.

It wants to pay tribute to those who served and currently serve in Kosovo 25 years after the deployment of the NATO peacekeeping force, KFOR, and to those who served in Afghanistan, as this year marks 10 years since the end of Operation Herrick. @Parish Pump

The policy of the Anglican Church Twente is to use donations and bequests to help fund significant development projects in the Chaplaincy, whether buildings, equipment, staff, or other major needs. As circumstances change over the years, it may not be possible to fulfil specific donor requests, so church members are encouraged to make donations and leave legacies for the general purposes of the Chaplaincy. The Chaplaincy Council will discuss with donors or their executors the most appropriate use of the gift in the light of current projects and the donor's known areas of interest in the church: for example, children & youth, music, buildings.


The main aims of the Anglican Church Twente are to:
